Memorial Day is a day to solemnly honor all men and women who have died in U.S. military service. Memorial Day began a few years after the Civil War, in 1868. An organization of Union Veterans established the holiday, then known as Decoration Day, as a time to decorate the graves of fallen soldiers with flowers.

In 1971, Memorial Day was established as a federal holiday taking place on the last Monday in May.

Poppies have become a symbol of Memorial Day because they are mentioned in a 1915 poem by Canadian soldier John McCrae, "In Flanders Fields."

that one month of not mowing is too long, consider mowing every other week or mow in sections, leaving some un-mowed sections for pollinators. Another option is to reseed your lawn with a "bee lawn" seed mix, which combines turf grass with low-growing flowers, such as white clover and creeping thyme.

When it's finally time to mow, reduce the height of your grass in stages by removing no more than one-third of grass.

Speed Bumps in Genoa City

Reasons Why Speed Bumps Are Important.

The main purpose of a speed bump is to slow people down. Speed bumps can hinder speeding vehicles before crossing entrances and exits, sharp turns, etc. This helps prevent accidents by a large margin. Speed bumps might be one of the few things that successfully discourage recklessness in drivers when they're in a hurry.

Speed bumps are useful to encourage safe driving in pedestrian zones.

Though speed zones are often set up to encourage safe driving, posted limits can be missed or ignored, so traffic calming in these areas often incorporates physical design of the roadway or environment. Pedestrians are very vulnerable to traffic and speeding. No matter how carefully they cross the road, a single speeding vehicle can put their life at risk.

Be courteous of your neighbors – slow down and keep our neighborhoods safe.

Water main flushing is an important preventative maintenance activity that:

- verifies proper operation of the hydrant
- evaluates the available flow to the hydrant
- allows utilities to deliver the highest quality water possible
- removes mineral and sediment build up from the water mains

During the process, you might experience a difference in water pressure in your faucets as well as some discoloration in the water. Once the hydrants have completed their flushing, it won't be long until your water is ready for normal use again. Water should run clear with just a few minutes of faucet flow. Turn your faucets on cold and let the water run for 5 minutes or so until it is clear.
